Thank you for seeking permission to conduct the annual Thanksgiving event on Thursday, November 25, 2021. I understand your request includes the closing of First Street between Atlantic Boulevard and Orange Street from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm.

By way of this letter, the City of Neptune Beach is to conditionally grant permission for this event as directed by the City Council at the October 18, 2021, Special Meeting. Conditions are as follows:

- 1. must meet and adhere to all rules established by the City Manager's Office and the Police Department of the City of Neptune Beach
- 2. observance of all laws and ordinances pertaining to the City of Neptune Beach, the State of Florida, and the Federal Government
- 3. each of the four (4) participating businesses must submit a liability insurance certificate for at least \$1 million naming the City of Neptune Beach as additional insured no later than 5:00 pm on Friday, November 19, 2021 (forward certificate to Cheryl Bäck at acm@nbfl.us)
- 4. each of the four (4) businesses participating will provide an extension of premises special event permit from the State Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco (forward State approval to Cheryl Bäck at <a href="mailto:acm@nbfl.us">acm@nbfl.us</a>)
- 5. a contact name and phone number of a person in a position of responsibility must be provided for the event from each of the three businesses
- 6. noise be kept to a minimal level, and no amplified sounds are allowed
- 7. signs are to be posted at each event entry listing prohibited items for event participants
- 8. outside alcohol is expressly prohibited

- 9. the primary responsibility of event holders is to periodically have trash cans emptied to prevent overflow of garbage
- 10. required hiring of two (2) Neptune Beach Public Works employees for purposes of monitoring garbage control for the duration of the event at standard rates for such employees for the date of the event (Contact NBPD Commander Gary Snyder at 904-270-2413 or via email at <a href="mailto:garysnyder@nbfl.us">garysnyder@nbfl.us</a> to coordinate)
- 11. required hiring of Rockaway, Inc. to install protective fencing around all landscaping and associated components servicing such landscaping and financial responsibility of the participating business for any damage to same.
- 12. the exclusive use of unbreakable/shatterproof containers by businesses
- 13. ensure that pets and bicycles are not in the event area
- 14. the area used must be free of debris once the event is completed
- 15. provide ten (10) portable toilets to service crowd; portable toilets are to be placed within the event boundary lines
- 16. the event coordinator(s) will post "No Parking after 12 am" signs at all First Street parking spaces between Atlantic Blvd. and Orange Street on Wednesday, 11/24, at 6:00 pm
- 17. traffic closures will be in place on Thursday, 11/25, from 8:30 am-1:30 pm, or until conditions allow, at the following locations (per attached event map):
  - a. First Street at Atlantic Blvd.
  - b. Lemon Street at First Street
  - c. Lemon Street at Midway
  - d. First Street at Orange Street
  - e. Hall Place at First Street
- 18. must provide five (5) "Road Closed" sign barricades (may contact ACME Barricades for rental information) at the following locations (per attached event map):
  - a. Atlantic Blvd & First Street
  - b. Orange Street & First Street
  - c. Lemon Street & First Street
  - d. Lemon Street & Second Street
  - e. Lemon Street & Midway
- 19. fifty (50) NBPD cones will be pre-staged and deployed as needed
- 20. required hiring of five (5) off-duty Police Officers to monitor the event to be compensated at \$85.00 per hour with a four-hour minimum
- 21. Police Officers must be on-duty from the time of street closure until the streets are cleared, reopened, and the crowd is dispersed
- 22. as the event runs from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm, agreement to have closed streets cleared and opened for traffic by 2:00 pm
- 23. agreement to be accountable for all private security throughout the event (for crowd control and ID checks)
- 24. must arrange for & provide a minimum of two (2) off-duty Firefighter/Paramedics (Contact JFRD)
- 25. the City assumes no liability for any accident or injury that may occur during the event, and your organization will hold the City harmless should any occur
- 26. failure to abide by any of the conditions set forth could result in the event being shut down at any time

### COUNCILOR KERRY CHIN COUNCILOR JOSH MESSINGER

#### A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NEPTUNE BEACH, FLORIDA, FURTHER EXTENDING A TEMPORARY MORATORIUM TO PROHIBIT THE ACCEPTANCE OR PROCESSING OF CERTAIN APPLICATIONS FOR A DEVELOPMENT ORDER OR ANY OTHER OFFICIAL ACTION OF THE CITY HAVING THE EFFECT OF PERMITTING OR ALLOWING FOR THE APPLICATION OF A PLAT OR REPLAT IN THE R-4 ZONING DISTRICT AS SET FORTH IN CHAPTER 27, UNIFIED LAND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS, DIVISION 3 SECTION 27-101 THROUGH 27-102, PLATTING REQUIREMENTS CHAPTER 27, UNIFIED LAND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS, DIVISION 4 SECTION 27-105 THROUGH 27-109, MINOR REPLAT REQUIREMENTS, AND 27-110 TEMPORARY MORATORIUM; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Section 2(b), Article VIII of the Florida Constitution and Chapter 166 of the Florida Statutes, the City of Neptune Beach possesses the powers to enact ordinances in order to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the City's citizens and residents; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council of the City of Neptune Beach, Florida determines that it is in the best interest of its residents, businesses and visitors to enact sufficient land use regulations and land use plans to ensure their health, safety and welfare; and

**WHEREAS,** to protect the public health, safety and welfare of its citizens, the City of Neptune Beach wants to review and discuss the platting and minor replat code regulations; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has noted the significant number of requested plats and replats of properties in the R-4 zoning district as established by Section 27-221 resulting in an increase in the number of lots in such district, as well as the significant number of potential future requests, and the potential effects of these activities on the unique character and environment of Neptune Beach and the R-4 zoning district, in particular, including but not limited to those effects caused by the impacts of high-tide events, storm surge, flash floods, stormwater runoff, and sea-level rise as recognized by the Florida Legislature in sec. 163.3178, Fla. Stat.; and

**WHEREAS,** the City Council determines that additional time is required to review, study, hold public hearings, and prepare and adopt an amendment or amendments to the

City of Neptune Beach Unified Land Development Code and/or Code of regarding platting and replatting of lots in the R-4 zoning district; and

**WHEREAS**, the City, along with its retained professionals, Dover, Kohl & Partners have prepared and adopted a vision plan and submitted a proposed Comprehensive Plan to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity; and

**WHEREAS**, such planning process has moved into Phase III regarding the adoption of potential revisions to the Unified Land Development, with an anticipated completion date of the first or second quarter of 2022; and

**WHEREAS**, the moratorium is currently scheduled to expire on November 2, 2021; and

**WHEREAS,** an extension of the temporary moratorium on the processing of applications for, and the issuance of approvals or any other official action of the City of Neptune Beach permitting or having the effect of allowing platting or replatting of lots in the R-4 zoning district will allow time for the completion of the revisions to the Unified Land Development Code; and

**WHEREAS**, to avoid further unnecessasry legislation, extending this moratorium beyond the anticipated completion date is in the best interest of the City in light of the fact that this moratorium may be terminated at any time by the City Council; and

**WHEREAS**, proper notice has been given of the public hearings of this proposed ordinance and of the public hearings in the accordance with applicable law; and

**WHEREAS**, the public hearings were held pursuant to the published notice described at which hearings the parties in interest and all others had an opportunity to be and were, in fact, heard; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council for the City of Neptune Beach, Florida finds and declares that this ordinance is in the best interest of the public health, safety and welfare of the citizens and residents of the City of Neptune Beach, Florida, that it permits the continued process of evaluation and drafting of revisions to the City's Comprehensive Plan and Unified Land Development Code and that it advances a significant and important governmental interest;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEPTUNE BEACH, FLORIDA, THAT:

ARTICLE III. – ADMINISTRATIVE AND ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURES

Sec. 27-110.

(c) Term.

The moratorium imposed by this ordinance is temporary and, unless dissolved earlier by the City, shall automatically dissolve in three hundred and sixty-five (365) days from the effective date of this ordinance, unless extended in accordance with applicable law. This moratorium may be reasonably extended, if necessary, by ordinance of the City Council.

#### (f) **Effective Date**.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage after second reading/public hearing.

#### A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NEPTUNE BEACH, FLORIDA, TO FURTHER EXTEND A TEMPORARY MORATORIUM TO PROHIBIT THE ACCEPTANCE OR PROCESSING OF ANY APPLICATION FOR A SPECIAL EXCEPTION PERMIT, DEVELOPMENT ORDER, OR ANY OTHER OFFICIAL ACTION OF THE CITY HAVING THE EFFECT OF PERMITTING OR ALLOWING FOR THE APPLICATION OF A PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT AS SET FORTH IN CHAPTER 27, UNIFIED LAND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS, SECTION 27-244 PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT AND 27-244.1 TEMPORARY MORATORIUM; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Section 2(b), Article VIII of the Florida Constitution and Chapter 166 of the Florida Statutes, the City of Neptune Beach possesses the powers to enact ordinances in order to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the City's citizens and residents; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council of the City of Neptune Beach, Florida determines that it is in the best interest of its residents, businesses and visitors to enact sufficient land use regulations to ensure their health, safety and welfare; and

**WHEREAS**, the City is actively engaged in the process of evaluating revisions to its Unified Land Development Code, including how planned unit developments are processed within the City and the City anticipates that such process will take additional time to complete; and

WHEREAS, the City Council for the City of Neptune Beach, Florida previously found and declared that a temporary moratorium regarding the City's consideration of any application for special exception permit, authorization or any other official action of the City having the effect of permitting or allowing the PUDs within the city limits was in the best interest of the public health, safety and welfare of the citizens and residents of the City of Neptune Beach, Florida and that it advanced a significant and important governmental interest; and

WHEREAS, the City Council for the City of Neptune Beach, Florida previously adopted a temporary moratorium on the City's consideration of any application for special exception permit, authorization or any other official action of the City having the effect of

permitting or allowing the PUDs within the city limits, may be accepted or processed or approved by the City, except as may be required by applicable law, in Ordinance No. 2019-03, with an effective date of March 4, 2019; and

- WHEREAS, the City Council for the City of Neptune Beach, Florida previously extended the temporary moratorium by Ordinance No. 2020-01 and further by Ordinance No. 2020-13, with the latter having an effective date of November 2, 2020, to allow the continued analysis of revisions to its Comprehensive Plan and the Unified Land Development Code; and
- **WHEREAS**, said temporary moratorium is scheduled to expire on November 2, 2021; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City's has adopted a vision plan and submitted a proposed Comprehensive Plan to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity and has entered into Phase III of its process with Dover, Kohl and Partners; and
- **WHEREAS**, Phase III consists of preparation of revisions to the Unified Land Development Code; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City does not anticipate that such process will be completed by November 2, 2021 and the City Council deems it to be in the best interest of the City and its citizens and residents to extend the moratorium based on an expected completion date in the first or second quarter of 2022; and
- **WHEREAS**, to avoid further unnecessasry legislation, extending this moratorium beyond the anticipated completion date is in the best interest of the City in light of the fact that this moratorium may be terminated at any time by the City Council; and
- **WHEREAS**, proper notice has been given of the public hearing of this proposed ordinance and of a public hearing in accordance with applicable law; and
- **WHEREAS,** the public hearings were held pursuant to the published notice described at which hearings the parties in interest and all others had an opportunity to be and were, in fact, heard; and
- WHEREAS, the City Council for the City of Neptune Beach, Florida finds and declares that an extension to the temporary moratorium regarding the City's consideration of any application for special exception permit, authorization or any other official action of the City having the effect of permitting or allowing the PUDs within the city limits is in the best interest of the public health, safety and welfare of the citizens and residents of the City of Neptune Beach, Florida, will permit the continued process of evaluation and drafting of revisions to the City's Comprehensive Plan and Unified Land Development Code, and will advance a significant and important governmental interest.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEPTUNE BEACH, FLORIDA, THAT:

#### ARTICLE IV. - LAND USE

#### Sec. 27-244.1. Temporary moratorium on permitting planned unit developments (PUD).

#### (c) Term.

The moratorium imposed by this ordinance is temporary and, unless dissolved earlier by the City, shall automatically dissolve three hundred and sixty-five (365) days after the effective date of this ordinance, unless extended in accordance with applicable law. This moratorium may be reasonably extended, if necessary, by ordinance of the City Council.

#### (f) **Effective Date**.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage after second reading/public hearing.

DATE:	October 13, 2021	
BACKGROUND:	This year the State of Florida passed legislation requiring the City to submit a plan for eliminating nonbeneficial surface water discharges from its Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF) by January 1, 2032. The legislation is associated with House Bill 64 (2021). The required plan must be submitted by November 1, 2021. If the plan is not submitted by November 1, 2021, the City's WWTF will not be allowedto dispose of its effluent to surface waters after January 1, 2028. On July 19, 2021, leadership from Atlantic Beach, Jacksonville Beach andNeptune Beach met to discuss the issues and explore options. The State's new legislation contain difficult deadlines, technical challenges, and exorbitant costs that it is not realistic to plan for in such a short window. Staff requested an extension with the FDEP that was denied.

Dear Jim,

This letter provides a second notification that as the permittee of a domestic wastewater treatment facility with a permitted discharge to surface waters in Florida, you are subject to new provisions in section 403.064(17), Florida Statutes (F.S.). The new provisions require you to submit a plan to eliminate nonbeneficial surface water discharges by January 1, 2032, to the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) for review and approval no later than November 1, 2021.

If the plan is not timely submitted by the utility by November 1, 2021, the utility's domestic wastewater treatment facilities may not dispose of effluent, reclaimed water, or reuse water by surface water discharge after January 1, 2028. DEP will review and approve or deny your plan within nine months of receipt. You may modify the plan by submitting the modification to DEP, but the requirements detailed below must be met and the time to implement shall not be extended. As required by statute, the plan shall be fully implemented by January 1, 2032.

If you have already submitted a plan, or a response indicating that a plan is not required under section 403.064(17), F.S., then you may disregard this letter.

Further details regarding the plan that must be submitted by November 1, 2021:

This plan must include the average number of gallons per day of effluent, reclaimed water or reuse water that will no longer be discharged into surface waters and the date of such elimination, the average number of gallons per day of surface water discharge which will continue if allowed by provisions 2. or 3. in the paragraph below, and the level of treatment the effluent, reclaimed water or reuse water will receive before being discharged into a surface water alternative.

#### Your plan will be approved by DEP if:

- 1. The plan will result in eliminating the surface water discharge.
- 2. The plan will result in meeting the requirements of section 403.086(10), F.S. (the statute related to the elimination of ocean outfall discharges).
- 3. The plan does not provide for a complete elimination of the surface water discharge, but does provide an affirmative demonstration that any of the following conditions apply to the remaining discharge:
  - a. The discharge is associated with an indirect potable reuse project;
  - b. The discharge is a wet weather discharge that occurs in accordance with an applicable department permit;
  - c. The discharge is into a stormwater management system and is subsequently withdrawn by a user for irrigation purposes;
  - d. The utility operates the domestic wastewater treatment facilities with reuse systems that reuse a minimum of 90 percent of a facility's annual average flow, as determined by DEP using monitoring data for the prior five consecutive years, for reuse purposes authorized by DEP; or
  - e. The discharge provides direct ecological or public water supply benefits, such as rehydrating wetlands or implementing the requirements of minimum flows and minimum water levels or recovery or prevention strategies for a waterbody.

The plan may include conceptual projects for 3.a. and 3.e. above, but this does not extend the time for plan implementation. Please note that discharges allowed under section 403.086(8)(a), F.S., may be included in the plan.

Permit applicants for a new or expanded surface water discharge shall develop a plan in accordance with the above requirements from section 403.064(17), F.S., to be submitted with the permit application.

Certain domestic wastewater treatment facilities can be exempt from the plan outlined above if they successfully demonstrate at least one of the following circumstances apply. However, documentation must still be supplied by the November 1, 2021, deadline to claim this exemption.

- 1. The domestic wastewater treatment facility is located in a fiscally constrained county as described in section 218.67(1), F.S.
- 2. The domestic wastewater treatment facility is located in a municipality that is entirely within a rural area of opportunity as designated pursuant to section 288.0656, F.S.
- 3. The domestic wastewater treatment facility is located in a municipality that has less than \$10 million in total revenue, as determined by the municipality's most recent annual financial report submitted to the Florida Department of Financial Services in accordance with section 218.32, F.S.
- 4. The domestic wastewater treatment facility that is operated by an operator of a mobile home park as defined in section 723.003, F.S., and has a permitted capacity of less than 300,000 gallons per day.

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An act relating to reclaimed water; amending s. 403.064, F.S.; requiring certain domestic wastewater utilities to submit to the Department of Environmental Protection by a specified date a plan for eliminating nonbeneficial surface water discharge within a specified timeframe; providing requirements for the plan; requiring the department to approve plans that meet certain requirements; requiring the department to make a determination regarding a plan within a specified timeframe; requiring the utilities to implement approved plans by specified dates; providing for administrative and civil penalties; requiring certain utilities to submit updated annual plans until certain conditions are met; requiring domestic wastewater utilities applying for permits for new or expanded surface water discharges to prepare a specified plan for eliminating nonbeneficial discharges as part of its permit application; requiring the department to submit an annual report to the Legislature by a specified date; providing applicability; providing construction; authorizing the department to convene and lead one or more technical advisory groups; providing that potable reuse is an alternative water supply and that projects relating to such reuse are eligible for alternative water supply funding; requiring the department and the water management districts to develop and execute, by a specified date, a memorandum of agreement for the

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coordinated review of specified permits; providing that potable reuse projects are eligible for certain expedited permitting and priority funding; providing construction; creating s. 403.892, F.S.; providing definitions; requiring counties, municipalities, and special districts to authorize graywater technologies under certain circumstances and to provide certain incentives for the implementation of such technologies; providing requirements for the use of graywater technologies; providing that the installation of residential graywater systems meets certain public utility water conservation measure requirements; providing for the applicability of specified reclaimed water aquifer storage and recovery well requirements; providing a declaration of important state interest; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Subsection (17) of section 403.064, Florida Statutes, is renumbered as subsection (18) and amended, and a new subsection (17) is added to that section, to read:

403.064 Reuse of reclaimed water.-

(17) By November 1, 2021, domestic wastewater utilities
that dispose of effluent, reclaimed water, or reuse water by
surface water discharge shall submit to the department for
review and approval a plan for eliminating nonbeneficial surface
water discharge by January 1, 2032, subject to the requirements
of this section. The plan must include the average gallons per

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day of effluent, reclaimed water, or reuse water that will no longer be discharged into surface waters and the date of such elimination, the average gallons per day of surface water discharge which will continue in accordance with the alternatives provided for in subparagraphs (a) 2. and 3., and the level of treatment that the effluent, reclaimed water, or reuse water will receive before being discharged into a surface water by each alternative.

- (a) The department shall approve a plan that includes all of the information required under this subsection as meeting the requirements of this section if one or more of the following conditions are met:
- 1. The plan will result in eliminating the surface water discharge.
- 2. The plan will result in meeting the requirements of s. 403.086(10).
- 3. The plan does not provide for a complete elimination of the surface water discharge but does provide an affirmative demonstration that any of the following conditions apply to the remaining discharge:
- <u>a. The discharge is associated with an indirect potable</u> reuse project;
- <u>b. The discharge is a wet weather discharge that occurs in</u> accordance with an applicable department permit;
- <u>c. The discharge is into a stormwater management system and is subsequently withdrawn by a user for irrigation purposes;</u>
- d. The utility operates domestic wastewater treatment facilities with reuse systems that reuse a minimum of 90 percent of a facility's annual average flow, as determined by the

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department using monitoring data for the prior 5 consecutive years, for reuse purposes authorized by the department; or

e. The discharge provides direct ecological or public water supply benefits, such as rehydrating wetlands or implementing the requirements of minimum flows and minimum water levels or recovery or prevention strategies for a waterbody.

- The plan may include conceptual projects under sub-subparagraphs 3.a. and 3.e.; however, such inclusion does not extend the time within which the plan must be implemented.
- (b) The department shall approve or deny a plan within 9 months after receiving the plan. A utility may modify the plan by submitting such modification to the department; however, the plan may not be modified such that the requirements of this subsection are not met, and the department may not extend the time within which a plan will be implemented. The approval of the plan or a modification by the department does not constitute final agency action.
- (c) A utility shall fully implement the approved plan by January 1, 2032.
- (d) If a plan is not timely submitted by a utility or approved by the department, the utility's domestic wastewater treatment facilities may not dispose of effluent, reclaimed water, or reuse water by surface water discharge after January 1, 2028. A violation of this paragraph is subject to administrative and civil penalties pursuant to ss. 403.121, 403.131, and 403.141.
- (e) A domestic wastewater utility applying for a permit for a new or expanded surface water discharge shall prepare a plan

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in accordance with this subsection as part of that permit application. The department may not approve a permit for a new or expanded surface water discharge unless the plan meets one or more of the conditions provided in paragraph (a).

- (f) By December 31, 2021, and annually thereafter, the department shall submit a report to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives which provides the average gallons per day of effluent, reclaimed water, or reuse water that will no longer be discharged into surface waters by the utility and the dates of such elimination; the average gallons per day of surface water discharges that will continue in accordance with the alternatives provided in subparagraphs (a) 2. and 3., and the level of treatment that the effluent, reclaimed water, or reuse water will receive before being discharged into a surface water by each alternative and utility; and any modified or new plans submitted by a utility since the last report.
  - (g) This subsection does not apply to any of the following:
- 1. A domestic wastewater treatment facility that is located in a fiscally constrained county as described in s. 218.67(1).
- 2. A domestic wastewater treatment facility that is located in a municipality that is entirely within a rural area of opportunity as designated pursuant to s. 288.0656.
- 3. A domestic wastewater treatment facility that is located in a municipality that has less than \$10 million in total revenue, as determined by the municipality's most recent annual financial report submitted to the Department of Financial Services in accordance with s. 218.32.
  - 4. A domestic wastewater treatment facility that is

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operated by an operator of a mobile home park as defined in s. 723.003 and has a permitted capacity of less than 300,000 gallons per day.

- (h) This subsection does not prohibit the inclusion of a plan for backup discharges under s. 403.086(8)(a).
- (i) This subsection may not be deemed to exempt a utility from requirements that prohibit the causing of or contributing to violations of water quality standards in surface waters, including groundwater discharges that affect water quality in surface waters.
- (18) (a) (17) By December 31, 2020, the department shall initiate rule revisions based on the recommendations of the Potable Reuse Commission's 2020 report "Advancing Potable Reuse in Florida: Framework for the Implementation of Potable Reuse in Florida." Rules for potable reuse projects must address contaminants of emerging concern and meet or exceed federal and state drinking water quality standards and other applicable water quality standards. Reclaimed water is deemed a water source for public water supply systems.
- (b) The Legislature recognizes that sufficient water supply is imperative to the future of the state and that potable reuse is a source of water which may assist in meeting future demand for water supply.
- (c) The department may convene and lead one or more technical advisory groups to coordinate the rulemaking and review of rules for potable reuse as required under this section. The technical advisory group, which shall assist in the development of such rules, must be composed of knowledgeable representatives of a broad group of interested stakeholders,

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including, but not limited to, representatives from the water management districts, the wastewater utility industry, the water utility industry, the environmental community, the business community, the public health community, the agricultural community, and the consumers.

- (d) Potable reuse is an alternative water supply as defined in s. 373.019, and potable reuse projects are eligible for alternative water supply funding. The use of potable reuse water may not be excluded from regional water supply planning under s. 373.709.
- (e) The department and the water management districts shall develop and execute, by December 31, 2023, a memorandum of agreement providing for the procedural requirements of a coordinated review of all permits associated with the construction and operation of an indirect potable reuse project. The memorandum of agreement must provide that the coordinated review will occur only if requested by a permittee. The purpose of the coordinated review is to share information, avoid the redundancy of information requested from the permittee, and ensure consistency in the permit for the protection of the public health and the environment.
- (f) To encourage investment in the development of potable reuse projects by private entities, a potable reuse project developed as a qualifying project under s. 255.065 is:
- 1. Beginning January 1, 2026, eligible for expedited permitting under s. 403.973.
- 2. Consistent with s. 373.707, eligible for priority funding in the same manner as other alternative water supply projects from the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund, under the

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Water Protection and Sustainability Program, and for water management district cooperative funding.

 $\underline{\text{(g)}}$  This subsection is not intended and may not be construed to supersede s. 373.250(3).

Section 2. Section 403.892, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

- 403.892 Incentives for the use of graywater technologies.-
- (1) As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "Developer" has the same meaning as in s. 380.031(2).
- (b) "Graywater" has the same meaning as in s.
- 214 381.0065(2)(e).

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- (2) To promote the beneficial reuse of water in the state, a county, municipality, or special district shall:
- (a) Authorize the use of residential graywater technologies in their respective jurisdictions which meet the requirements of this section, the Florida Building Code, and applicable requirements of the Department of Health and for which a developer or homebuilder has received all applicable regulatory permits or authorizations.
- (b) Provide a 25 percent density or intensity bonus to a developer or homebuilder if at least 75 percent of a proposed or existing development will have a graywater system installed or a 35 percent bonus if 100 percent of a proposed or an existing development will have a graywater system installed. The bonus under this paragraph is in addition to any bonus provided by a county, municipality, or special district ordinance in effect on July 1, 2021.
- (3) To qualify for the incentives under subsection (2), the developer or homebuilder must certify to the applicable

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governmental entity as part of its application for development approval or amendment of a development order that all of the following conditions are met:

- (a) The proposed or existing development has at least 25 single-family residential homes that are either detached or multifamily dwellings. This paragraph does not apply to multifamily projects over five stories in height.
- (b) Each single-family residential home or residence will have its own residential graywater system that is dedicated for its use.
- manufacturer's warranty or data providing reasonable assurance that the residential graywater system will function as designed and includes an estimate of anticipated potable water savings for each system. A submission of the manufacturer's warranty or data from a building code official, governmental entity, or research institute that has monitored or measured the residential graywater system that is proposed to be installed for such development shall be accepted as reasonable assurance and no further information or assurance is needed.
- (d) The required maintenance of the graywater system will be the responsibility of the residential homeowner.
- (e) An operation and maintenance manual for the graywater system will be supplied to the initial homeowner of each home.

  The manual shall provide a method of contacting the installer or manufacturer and shall include directions to the residential homeowner that the manual shall remain with the residence throughout the life cycle of the system.
  - (4) If the requirements of subsection (3) have been met,

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the county or municipality must include the incentives provided for in subsection (2) when it approves the development or amendment of a development order. The approval must also provide for the process that the developer or homebuilder will follow to verify that such systems have been purchased. Proof of purchase must be provided within 180 days after the issuance of a certificate of occupancy for single-family residential homes that are either detached or multifamily projects under five stories in height.

(5) The installation of residential graywater systems in a county or municipality in accordance with this section shall qualify as a water conservation measure in a public water utility's water conservation plan under s. 373.227. The efficiency of such measures shall be commensurate with the amount of potable water savings estimated for each system provided by the developer or homebuilder under paragraph (3)(c).

Section 3. To further promote the reuse of reclaimed water for irrigation purposes, the rules that apply when reclaimed water is injected into a receiving groundwater that has 1,000 to 3,000 mg/L total dissolved solids are applicable to reclaimed water aquifer storage and recovery wells injecting into a receiving groundwater of less than 1,000 mg/L total dissolved solids if the applicant demonstrates that it is injecting into a confined aquifer, that there are no potable water supply wells within 3,500 feet of the aquifer storage and recovery wells, that it has implemented institutional controls to prevent the future construction of potable water supply wells within 3,500 feet of the aquifer storage and recovery wells, and that the recovered water is being used for irrigation purposes. The

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injection of reclaimed water that meets the requirements of this
section is not potable reuse. This section may not be construed
to exempt the reclaimed water aquifer storage and recovery wells
from requirements that prohibit the causing of or contribution
to violations of water quality standards in surface waters,
including groundwater discharges that flow by interflow and
affect water quality in surface waters.

I would like to propose the following change to the ordinance regarding dogs on the beach time restrictions.

My proposal would be to eliminate the time restraints on the beach and mirror the City of Atlantic Beaches ordinance. This would allow our citizens and public to come to our beach year-round with their dogs.

With Atlantic Beach and Neptune beach sharing a border it becomes confusing to visitors knowing the boundary lines and knowing they have crossed into a new jurisdiction with different ordinances.

There are no clear markers indicating they have crossed into another beach. Most of our violators are time restriction violators who are given a verbal warning advising them, they have crossed over into Neptune Beach from Atlantic Beach.

With changing this ordinance this would not change the patrolling on the beach it would just eliminate the confusion of time restraints on a public beach.

Neptune Beach would further become known as a dog friendly beach just like Atlantic Beach.

Citations would still be issued for off leash violations and defecation removal violators.

### Sec. 6-31. - Dogs on the beach.

- (a) Dogs are permissible on the Atlantic Ocean Beach adjacent to the city during the following time periods:
- (1) At any hour from October 1 st through March 31 st; and
- (2) During the hours of 5:00 p.m. through 9:00 a.m., from April 1 st through September 30 th.

- (b) In addition to the above provisions, all owners, custodians and/or persons responsible for and in control of any dog(s) on the beach must comply with following:
- (1) Each such dog must be fastened to a suitable leash of dependable strength not to exceed twelve (12) feet in length and the leash must be held or controlled by that person at all times. Electric collars, E collars or Remote Collars are no allowed there must be a physical leash always attached to your dog and held by a person.
- (2) Any person having a dog on the beach during the above-enumerated hours must carry with and on such person suitable materials and utensils with which to remove from the beach any fecal matter deposited by such dog and must remove any fecal matter immediately upon its deposit by the dog under the person's supervision and control.
- (3) Each such dog must have affixed to its collar a current rabies inoculation tag evidencing the dog has be properly inoculated against rabies within the past year. The civil penalties for violation of this chapter shall be those set forth in section 6-5.
- (4) If dog and the person responsible for such dog's presence on the beach are in the Atlantic Ocean together, the dog shall be allowed to swim unleashed and then immediately put back on the leash before returning to the beach. This does not include walking the dog in the water.
- (5) Any person spending more than 30 minutes on the beach must be able to provide potable water for their dog and must have a way to provide shade for their dog.
- (b) The civil penalties for violation of this chapter shall be those set forth in section 6-5

### A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 6-31 REGARDING DOGS ON THE BEACH TO ESTABLISH CONSISTENCY WITH ATLANTIC BEACH; CLARIFYING LEASH REQUIREMENTS; REQUIRING CERTAIN PROTECTIONS FOR DOGS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Section 6-31 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Neptune Beach, the City regulates the presence of dogs on the Atlantic Ocean Beach adjacent to the City; and

**WHEREAS**, the City restricts time periods during which dogs are permissible on the Atlantic Ocean Beach; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Atlantic Beach does not currently restrict the time periods during which dogs are permissible on the Atlantic Ocean Beach; and

**WHEREAS**, the City's Animal Control/Service Officer has observed confusion on the part of persons walking dogs across the city limits between the City and the City of Atlantic Beach who are unaware of the differences between the respective Codes of Ordinances; and

**WHEREAS**, elimination of time restrictions on the presence of dogs on the Atlantic Ocean Beach will eliminate such confusion, assist the Animal Control/Service Officer in the performance of their duties, and provide for a more predictable regulatory scheme regarding the matter; and

**WHEREAS**, the City's Animal Control/Service Officer has also observed that dogs brought to the Atlantic Ocean Beach are frequently not provided with a means of potable water or shade, potentially causing harm to the animals; and

**WHEREAS**, the City desires to establish provisions to protect the health, safety and welfare of such animals by instituting certain requirements for dogs to be brought to the beach for a significant period of time; and

**WHEREAS**, the City's Animal Control/Service Officer has also observed the use of electric collars and remote collars on dogs brought to the Atlantic Ocean Beach; and

**WHEREAS**, such devices provide insufficient control of dogs to protect members of the public enjoying the Atlantic Ocean Beach; and

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**WHEREAS**, the City Council for the City of Neptune Beach, Florida finds and declares that this ordinance is in the best interest of the public health, safety and welfare of the citizens and residents of the City, that it advances a significant and important governmental interest, and that it furthers the City's performance of municipal functions and rendering of municipal services.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEPTUNE BEACH, FLORIDA, THAT:

- Section 1. Amending Section 6-31 of the City of Neptune Beach Code of Ordinances. Section 6-31 of the City of Neptune Beach Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:
  - (a) Dogs are permissible on the Atlantic Ocean Beach adjacent to the city <u>year-round</u>. during the following time periods:
    - (1) At any hour from October 1st through March 31st; and
    - (2) During the hours of 5:00 p.m. through 9:00 a.m., from April 1st through September 30th.
  - (b) In addition to the above provisions, all owners, custodians and/or persons responsible for and in control of any dog(s) on the beach must comply with following:
    - (1) Each such dog must be fastened to a suitable leash of dependable strength not to exceed twelve (12) feet in length and the leash must be held or controlled by that person at all times. <u>Electric collars</u>, remote <u>collars</u>, or other non-physically connected collars or leashes do not comply <u>with this requirement. The person must control a leash physically connected to the dog.</u>
    - (2) Any person having a dog on the beach during the above-enumerated hours must carry with and on such person suitable materials and utensils with which to remove from the beach any fecal matter deposited by such dog and must remove any fecal matter immediately upon its deposit by the dog under the person's supervision and control.
    - (3) Each such dog must have affixed to its collar a current rabies inoculation tag evidencing the dog has been properly inoculated against rabies within the past year. The civil penalties for violation of this chapter shall be those set forth in section 6-5.
    - (4) If dog and the person responsible for such dog's presence on the beach are in the Atlantic Ocean together, the dog shall be allowed to swim unleashed and then immediately put back on the leash before returning to the beach. This does not include walking the dog in the water.

<b>Section 2. Severability.</b> If any section, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held or declared to be unconstitutional, inoperative or void, such holding or invalidity shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance, and it shall be construed to be the legislative intent to pass this Ordinance without such unconstitutional, invalid or inoperative part therein.
Section 3. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become immediately upon passage by the City Council.
